<p>The Boeing B17 is one of the best known bombers of the Second World War. 12 731 were built between 1935 and 1945. Half were destroyed during the war and those which survived ended their days in the famous Arizona aeroplane graveyards later to be cut up for scrap. Only about 30 still exist of which 15 are in flying condition.</p> <p>The 2 aeroplanes still flying in Europe come from the French IGN (Institute National Geographique) where they were used from 1945 to 1985 for map making all over the world.</p> <p>This is the last French B 17 named "The Pink Lady" after having stered in the film Memphis Belle. (It had previously taken part in several other films including "La Grande Vadrouille", a classic french comedy film which has not aged one day since it was made). This aeroplane is the only flying B 17 which actually participated in the bomber offensive making 6 raids in 1944. It belonged to the 351st Bomber Group of the 8th airforce and once again carries their colors today.</p>
